


The Division of Oil and Public Safety regulates those who own or operate amusement rides and devices, commercial boilers, conveyances (elevators and escalators) and retail fueling facilities and those who are permitted to use high explosives.

Regulatory Intent

- Standards:
 - Construction
 - Operation
 - Inspection
 - Repair and maintenance
- Safety of the general public
- Financial standards
- Registration process





What is an Amusement Ride or Device?

- Mechanized devices or combination of devices
- Carry or convey people along, around, or over a fixed or restricted course
- Provide amusement, pleasure, thrills, excitement, or natural environment experience
- At amusement parks, carnivals, fairs, festivals, malls, ski resorts, adventure centers
- Includes bungee jumps/trampolines, family fun centers, climbing walls, go-karts, bumper devices, gravitypropelled rides, water slides, trampolines, aerial adventure courses, simulators



Which Rides or Devices are Exempt?

- Coin or self-operated devices
- Playground equipment
- Live animal rides or live animal shows
- Inflatable devices
- Devices not open to the public
- Devices inspected and permitted by a local, state or federal agency





How Do I Register?

Amusement Rides and Devices Program Registration Process



What Do I Need?

- Application
- Liability insurance information
- List of regulated rides or devices and serial numbers
- Third-Party inspection information
- Reportable injury confirmation (if required)
- Application fees: \$500.00 registration fee; \$130.00 per device.





How Do I Register My Rides or Devices?

Option 1: Mail

- Download application from website and complete
- Mail with fees and Certificate of Inspection
- Insurance carrier sends Certificate of Liability Insurance to <u>cdle_amusements@state.co.us</u> or fax to 303-318-8534



How Do I Register My Rides or Devices?

Option 2: Email/ online

- Download application from website and complete
- Contact OPS for itemized invoice
- Email application and Certificate of Inspection to <u>cdle_amusements@state.co.us</u>
- Pay fees with credit card or electronic check at <u>www.colorado.gov/payment/amusementrides</u>
- Insurance carrier sends Certificate of Liability Insurance to <u>cdle_amusements@state.co.us</u> or fax to 303-318-8534



Registration Application Keys

- If hand-written, PRINT clearly
- Complete all sections and review
- Call or email OPS if unsure of correct amount to pay
- Must provide location(s) of operation and update accordingly
- Must provide serial number and manufacturer information for all regulated devices
- Must complete and sign Certification page





Certificate of Liability Insurance Keys

- Updated certificate must be received annually
- Operator responsible for contacting insurer
- Must be sent directly from insurer to OPS
- Listing OPS as the Certificate Holder

Notifications To OPS

- New insurance carrier
- New Responsible Person
- Address changes
- Reportable injuries (if unsure, always call)
- New devices or operating locations
- No longer operating



Notifications From OPS

- Expired Certificate of Inspection
- Expired Certificate of Liability Insurance
- Renewal Notices 60 and 30 days prior to permit expiration
- Expired Permit
- Bulletins
 - Safety
 - Quarterly



Renewal Process

- Repeat original application process
- Allows OPS to:
 - Validate permit records
 - Track frequency and type of injuries
 - Track Third-Party inspection issues



Can you open a device to the public before the registration permit is effective?



ABSOLUTELY NOT!



Inspections

Third Party Inspections Audit Inspections by OPS



Third Party Inspection Keys

- Schedule early
- Have records available
 - Daily inspections
 - Maintenance
 - Training
 - Injury Reports
- Mitigate discrepancies promptly



What is an Audit Inspector?

- Reviews Third Party inspection reports
- Resource for:
 - Installation of new rides
 - Sourcing materials
 - Industry contacts
 - Maintenance and safety programs setup

What is an Injury?

An injury results in death or requires medical treatment by:

- A physician
- A registered professional personnel under the standing orders of a physician





Is First Aid Medical Treatment?


Medical treatment does **not** include:

- First aid treatment
- One-time treatment and subsequent observation of minor scratches, cuts, burns and splinters
- Other minor injuries that do not ordinarily require medical care





What is a Reportable Injury?






Reportable Injury

- Any Injury (as defined) caused by a malfunction or failure of an Amusement Ride or Device, or any Injury (as defined) caused by a Ride Operator or patron error.
- Ride Operator: The person that has control of a ride or device at all times or is supervising a patron-directed device when it is being operated for the public's use.



What are Some Common Non-Reportable Injuries?

- Abrasions
- Bruising
- Small Cuts
- Sprains
- Strains





What are Some Examples of Reportable Injuries?

- Lacerations
- Fractures
- Incised Wounds
- Internal Organ Damage
- Punctures
- Second- or Third-Degree Burns



How Quickly Do I Have to Report an Injury?

- Notify OPS within 24 hours of becoming aware of reportable injury

- Injury reports, as provided by the Division or equivalent, shall be maintained and made available to the Division for investigation. Copies must be submitted upon request from the Division.



What Happens After I Report an Injury?

- Audit Inspector Record Review
 - Maintenance
 - Operations
 - Training
- Re-Inspection by Third Party Inspector



What Information Should Be Included in the Injury Report?

- Date, Time, Location
- Injured Person(s)
- Witnesses
- Ride or Device Involved
- Ride or Device Operator
- Details of Injury, Cause, Care Given



Loss & Incident Trends

- Collisions with objects or other riders resulting in significant injuries on zip lines have significantly decreased.
- OPS staff noted a lack of documentation as an area of needed improvement for many sites
- Injuries sustained in transport (in vans, ATVs, etc.) have significantly increased at sites that include guest transport.







Rule Changes Effective July 15, 2019



Key Rule Changes - General

- Updated standards
- Clarifications and consistent language
- Added new definitions
- New Installation and Major modification language



Key Rule Changes - Operators

- Three Inspection types required:
 - Daily
 - Annual
 - New Installation/Major Modification
- Regardless of date of manufacture, operations must comply with either ASTM F770 or ANSI/ACCT 03-2016 Chapter 2
- Specific requirements in Regulations for Aerial Adventure Courses, including Zip Lines and Free Fall Devices



Key Rule Changes – Inspector Certification

- How to obtain certification from OPS (annually)
- Certifications with Endorsements (Type 1-5)
- Qualifications for each type
- Revocation, Suspension or Denial



Are 3rd party inspectors subject to enforcement actions for improper inspections?



Yes.




Key Rule Changes – Third Party Inspectors

- CO Statute requires the use of Third Party Inspectors
- CO Regulations require Inspectors to register and for Operators to use Inspectors on the approved inspector list
- CO Regulations require that official inspection certificates must be completed and signed by OPS-certified inspectors
- New Regulations added:
 - For annual inspections, Third Party Inspector cannot be affiliated with Operator
 - Inspections regarding new Installations and Major Modifications cannot be affiliated with Operator or Manufacturer

Amusement Rides and Devices





Enforcement Process

Notice of Violation

- Violations must be resolved in 30 days
- Possible shut down
- Minor fine



30 days

Enforcement Order

- NOV requirements not met
- Increased fines and possible shut down



30 days

Attorney General

- EO requirements not met
- Increased fines
- Judicial enforcement

- May be due to:
 - Not renewing your annual registration
 - Not registering a device
 - Not reporting an injury
 - Improper inspection by 3rd party inspector
- Read the Notice of Violation letter and call the OPS team member listed on the letter
- Submit the required information

Dear Jane Smith:

The Amusement Rides and Devices Regulations, Code of Colorado Regulations 7 CCR 1101-12, are administered by the Colorado Division of Oil and Public Safety - Amusement Rides and Devices Program (OPS). Our office was notified on June 1, 2019, that Amusements, LLC was operating two animal ride devices at the Denver Mall.

OPS conducted an inspection and/or review of the above referenced incident and, based on our preliminary review of information, has determined that Amusements, LLC is in violation of the Colorado Amusements Regulations, as detailed below.

Violation # 1	
Violation Date:	2019
Violation:	Failure to register the following amusement rides and devices with OPS: animal rides.
Regulatory Requirement:	7 CCR 1101-2, Article 2.
Required Action:	Complete all requirements and submit a check or money order for fines assessed; or you may contact OPS to schedule an informal conference with the Division Director.
Fine:	\$1,000.00


Compliance Trends – Colorado Amusement Rides
